Discipleship & Values

What is a Disciple?

When you hear the word disciple, what's the first thing that comes to mind?

DISCIPLE

A disciple is a person who, through faith, has received a new identity from God through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We become disciples by believing the Gospel. The word Gospel means good news. Specifically, the Gospel is the good news about Jesus Christ: His life, death, and resurrection has secured our salvation and reconciled us to God. Becoming a disciple not only allows us to look forward to an eternity with God, but also to experience the power and direction of God in our everyday lives as we follow Jesus. You can become a disciple by surrendering your life to Jesus and asking Him to be your Savior.

WE ARE A PEOPLE

A disciple is an individual who is following Jesus while being part of a community that belongs to God.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

—1 Peter 2:9-10

This passage refers to all believers everywhere throughout history. Because of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, every disciple, by grace through faith, is brought from death to life (Eph. 2) and becomes a member of God's people.

At Woodside, we are a part of this people! We are a local, visible representation of God's Kingdom in Southeast Michigan.

Discuss

We often have an individualized perspective on being a disciple. How does having an identity as "a people" challenge cultural norms?

WOODSIDE'S
DISCIPLESHIP
MODEL

Every action we take is the expression of an identity, whether it be the new identity we have in Christ or our old identity, which was anchored in our accomplishments or things that had happened to us.



We believe that all humans, regardless of their faith, express their identity in three main ways: through **worship**, **community**, and **mission**. For instance, a person who gains their identity from their job may express worship towards money, seek community with those who can help them advance their career, and engage in the mission of accomplishing all their goals and dreams. A person who gets their identity from being a parent may worship the comfort of their children, find community with other parents, and live on mission to raise a successful child.

Discuss

Who are you? What does your response tell you about where you find your identity? What effects do you see in your life when you start to find your identity in appearance, success, freedom, relationships, or other things?

As Disciples of Jesus, we're learning what it means to live out of our new identity—which has been secured through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. A disciple expresses this identity in three ways: toward God through **WORSHIP**, with the Church through **COMMUNITY**, and with the world through **MISSION**.

These expressions of identity are critical to being a healthy disciple. Consider a three-legged stool with only one or two legs—it's unstable and not fully fulfilling its purpose. Similarly, if one of these expressions is missing, you are not experiencing the fullness of being a disciple of Jesus.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

— Romans 12:1-2

Now that Jesus has transformed us and made us holy before the Father, we're called to live our entire lives as expressions of worship to God.

WHAT IS WORSHIP?

Worship is the acknowledgement and praise of God's character, glory, power, actions, and being. True worship of God leads to great joy in the life of a believer.

HOW DO WE EXPRESS OUR IDENTITY TOWARD GOD IN WORSHIP?

We're called to worship God with our whole lives. There are many ways we can do that, both individually and as a Life Group! Some examples include:

- Singing (Psalm 96:1-2, 1 Chronicles 16:9)
- 2 Spending time with God (Hebrews 4:16)
- Rejoicing and giving thanks (1 Thessalonians 5:16–18)
- 4 Sharing the Gospel (Romans 15:15-17)
- 5 Considering the works and creation of God (Psalm 19:1)

Now the full number of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one said that any of the things that belonged to him was his own, but they had everything in common. And with great power the apostles were giving their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as were owners of lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold and laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need. Thus Joseph, who was also called by the apostles Barnabas (which means son of encouragement), a Levite, a native of Cyprus, sold a field that belonged to him and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet.

WHAT IS COMMUNITY?

We are the body of Christ created in the image of God, who exists in community with the Trinity. The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit have eternally existed in relationship with one another as one God in three persons. God is a relational being. He created us as relational beings so that we might reflect His image. Living in community with a local church and a Life Group reflects the nature of God and brings life to the believer.

It is by the grace of God that a congregation is permitted to gather visibly in this world to share God's Word and sacrament [baptism and communion]. Not all Christians receive this blessing. HOW DO WE EXPRESS OUR IDENTITY TOWARD THE CHURCH THROUGH COMMUNITY?

As a community, we reflect the goodness of God and preach the Gospel with our lives. Some examples of living life in community include, but aren't limited to:

- Caring for other believers (Matthew 25:40)
- 2 Bearing each other's burdens (Galatians 6:2)
- 3 Loving each other (John 13:34-35)
- 4 Sharing meals together (Acts 2:46)
- 5 Confessing sin to each other (James 5:16)

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. And when they saw Him they worshiped Him, but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

— *Matthew 28:18-20*

God the Father sent his Son, Jesus, into human history to reconcile us to Himself. Jesus also sends the Spirit to us as we engage in His mission. Therefore, we are missionaries created in the image of a sent and sending God (John 17:18).

WHAT IS MISSION?

Mission is the acknowledgement of and participation in the work of God—His redemption and restoration through the Gospel. As a community, we're called to live lives that reflect God's goodness, mercy, and grace in ways that show the world around us the saving and transforming love and power of Jesus Christ.



The mission of Jesus is yours to participate in. It has always been God's intention to choose normal, everyday people, and show His amazing power and glory through them. He's not looking for the most impressive person because He already is that person.

HOW DO WE EXPRESS OUR IDENTITY TOWARD THE WORLD THROUGH MISSION?

We're called to live our lives intentionally and missionally—not only loving our brothers and sisters in the Church, but also engaging with and loving our neighbors in the world. We do this because Jesus commanded us in His authority to GO so that our neighbors might see the glory of God and be stirred to answer God's call for their own salvation.

We're called to engage in God's mission personally and as a community. Some examples we see of mission in the Bible include:

- Sharing the Gospel (Mark 16:15)
- Loving each other well around non-believers (John 13:35)
- Meeting practical physical needs (Matthew 15:32)
- Engaging in new activities as we find common ground (1 Corinthians 9:22)
- 5 Caring for orphans and widows (James 1:27)

OUR LIFE GROUP

Now that you've had the chance to explore Woodside's discipleship model and discuss how your Life Group is expressing...

IDENTITY toward God through **WORSHIP**, **IDENTITY** toward the church through **COMMUNITY**, and **IDENTITY** toward the world through **MISSION**,

...it's time to assess how well you're balancing all three.



Discuss

As a group, take a few moments to discuss how thoroughly you engage in worship, community, and mission. Remember the earlier analogy of the three-legged stool? Is your stool lopsided?

Over the next few weeks, you'll be learning what it looks like to express your identity in Christ through the lens of Woodside's core values.

OUR VALUES

At Woodside, we're guided by a set of core values that shape how we express what it means to be a new creation in Christ. These values form the foundation upon which we build our spiritual family as an expression of God's love. This means that each expression of our identity in Christ has components of truth, goodness, and beauty challenging us to engage our heads, hearts, and hands as disciples of Jesus.

Truth: We love and proclaim God's truth.

Goodness: We receive and respond to God's goodness.

Beauty: We enjoy and create as a reflection of God's beauty.

As we look closer at truth, goodness, and beauty, we'll explore how to incorporate each of them as you express your identity towards God in worship, toward the Church in community, and toward the world through mission. During this study, your group will have the opportunity to grow in the area(s) that may be like a missing leg of the stool. We hope you'll learn how to live a balanced life of worship, community, and mission as disciples!



Value One

RUTH

We love and proclaim God's truth.

When you hear the word **truth**, what's the first thing that comes to mind?

WHAT IS TRUTH?

That which communicates the reality of God.

WHERE IS TRUTH FOUND?

God Himself, the creator of the universe, makes Himself known through His word.

For thus says the Lord, who created the heavens (He is God!), who formed the earth and made it (He established it; He did not create it empty, He formed it to be inhabited!): "I am the Lord, and there is no other. I did not speak in secret, in a land of darkness; I did not say to the offspring of Jacob, 'Seek me in vain.' I the Lord speak the truth; I declare what is right.

— Isaiah 45:18-19

The Word of the Lord is truth, and Jesus Himself is the Word of God (John 1:1). He is the image of the invisible God (Colossians 1:15) and made a way for us to know God personally.

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

— John 14:6

God's Word is tied to the Gospel. Part of speaking truth is declaring the Gospel that has given us a new identity and is secured through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

Question

In a world where truth is thought to be subjective (based on personal opinion) instead of objective (based on verifiable facts), what challenges do we encounter when we hold to the Word of God as objective truth?

WE LOVE GOD'S TRUTH So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed Him, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples."

— John 8:31

We love God because He first loved us (John 4:19). The Gospel compels us to love God's truth and abide in it, so that we might know God more fully and be transformed into the likeness of His Son.

Let's look at how God uses His Word in our lives as His disciples:

Read Psalm 19:7-11 (ESV), underlining the things that stand out about God's Word:

The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul; the testimony of the Lord is sure, making wise the simple; the precepts of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes; the fear of the Lord is clean, enduring forever; the rules of the Lord are true, and righteous altogether. More to be desired are they than gold, even much fine gold; sweeter also than honey and drippings of the honeycomb. Moreover, by them is your servant warned; in keeping them there is great reward.

Question

Based on the above passage, what does God's truth provide?

As we abide in God's truth, the Holy Spirit works through the Word, transforming our minds, hearts, souls, and actions to be conformed to the image of Christ.

WE PROCLAIM GOD'S TRUTH We can proclaim God's truth to the people around us through our words and actions.

Whoever speaks the truth gives honest evidence, but a false witness utters deceit.

— *Proverbs* 12:17

Proclaiming truth with our words doesn't just mean quoting Scripture; it also includes communicating honestly with one another. When we speak truthfully to one another with love and compassion, we stand out in a world where dishonesty is widely accepted as a necessary means for personal gain or keeping peace.

Read 2 Timothy 3:16-17 (ESV) and fill in the missing words:

The Scriptures show us how to live according to God's standards, which is a counter-cultural way of life:

- Forgiving over and over again (Matthew 18:21-22)
- Living a life of radical generosity (Acts 4:34-35)
- Not seeking revenge for evil (Romans 12:17-21)
- 4 Putting others before yourself (Philippians 2:3)

When we live according to God's instructions, our lives proclaim God's truth.

Discuss


Which do you find more challenging, proclaiming truth with your words or your actions? Discuss ways you can improve in the area you find most challenging.

Let's explore how loving and proclaiming God's truth helps us express our identity in Christ toward God through worship, our identity toward the Church through community, and our identity toward the world through mission.

WORSHIP

But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the *Father is seeking such people to worship Him.*

— John 4:23

True worship is inseparable from the truth of God. Receiving God's truth will lead us to love Him more and proclaim that in our worship.

Expressing truth in worship means to proclaim truth to one another and back to God.

What does this look like in your group? Discuss the options below, then write in an idea of your own:


- Confess difficulties and sin to God and each other by being honest about what you struggle with.
- Pray God's Word together. You can start with a Psalm and make the author's words your own.

COMMUNITY

Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into Him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.

— *Ephesians 4*:15-16

When truth is the foundation of our community, we can grow to better reflect the image of the triune God (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit).



LOVING TRUTH IN COMMUNITY

Experiencing truth in community looks like helping each other love truth while allowing it to do a transforming work in your lives.

PROCLAIMING TRUTH IN COMMUNITY

Truth will become a marker of your community when you regularly proclaim it to one another.

- Make a habit of texting Scripture to each other.
- Practice being open and honest about your thoughts and feelings. If you've been wronged by or disagree with someone in your group, go to them directly regarding the offense. Do so with grace and compassion, working towards restoration and avoiding bitterness.

MISSION

We're called to share the truth of the Gospel with all creation. We're more effective when we do it together!

- Memorize Scripture so that you can share it with others.

VALUING TRUTH

We value truth because it's...

A reflection of God

The source of our salvation (Jesus Himself)!

God's truth has the power to transform our lives and make us more like Jesus. Valuing truth means we love and proclaim it. It also means we allow it to inform our daily lives: how we think, speak, act, worship, live in community, and live on mission to the world around us.

Let's Pray

Heavenly Father, thank you for Your Word. Thank you that we can know about You because of the Bible and know You personally because of Your Son. Help us to be a people that loves the truth. Allow it to transform our lives. May we meditate on it, hide it in our hearts, and obey it with our lives. Help us to be a people that proclaims the truth. Help us to be honest with one another, speak Scripture to each other, and share the Gospel with the world around us. May our lives give You glory! Amen.

Value Two

GOODNESS: We receive and respond to the goodness of God.

When you hear the word **goodness**, what's the first thing that comes to mind?

WHAT IS GOODNESS?

That which displays the character of God.

WHERE IS GOODNESS FOUND?

Goodness and redemption belong to God.

Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good! Blessed is the man who takes refuge in Him! Oh, fear the Lord, you his saints, for those who fear Him have no lack! The young lions suffer want and hunger; but those who seek the Lord lack no good thing. Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord delivers Him out of them all. He keeps all his bones; not one of them is broken. Affliction will slay the wicked, and those who hate the righteous will be condemned. The Lord redeems the life of his servants; none of those who take refuge in Him will be condemned.

— Psalm 34:8-10 & 19-22

Discuss

How have you tasted and seen God's goodness in your life? With your Life Group, share one good thing you have received from God.

Psalm 34:10 says, "...those who seek the Lord lack no good thing." If we're honest with ourselves, sometimes it's hard to believe this. Think of a situation that is causing you anxiety because you don't see much good in it.

Psalm 73 is a great example of someone struggling to believe God is good in the middle of difficult circumstances. In verses 1-15, the psalmist lists the injustices he has experienced. But then his focus changes mid-Psalm.

Read Psalm 73:16-17. Where did the psalmist go to receive perspective on his circumstances?

Even though his circumstances didn't seem to change, worshiping God led the psalmist to remember God's character and presence. The psalmist's definition of goodness changed by the end of the Psalm: "But for me it is good to be near God" (v. 28).

God is near to us because Jesus made the way to Him through our redemption. God has been good to us in so many ways, but redemption (Psalm 34:22) is the ultimate good we experience from God's hand.

WE RECEIVE GOD'S GOODNESS

The goodness of God is demonstrated through His character, which means we can receive His goodness when we focus on His character. Here are just a few examples from Scripture:

Kindness: God's kindness leads us to repentance (Romans 2:4)


Mercy: God's mercy and love brings us salvation in Christ (Ephesians 2:4-6)

Compassion: God is near to the brokenhearted (Psalm 34:18)

Faithfulness: God remains faithful, even when we are faithless (2 Timothy 2:13)

Love: God's love holds us through life's trials (Romans 8:38-39)

Can you think of and share other aspects of God's character that we receive as goodness?



WE RESPOND TO GOD'S GOODNESS

Receiving God's goodness moves our hearts to respond to God. Psalm 63 shows us just some of the ways we might respond:

Seek Him and thirst for Him (v. 1)

Praise Him (v. 3)

Find our satisfaction in Him (v. 5)

Sing for joy (v. 7)

Cling to Him (v.8)

Receiving God's goodness also changes the way we respond to others. When we express goodness in our relationships, Scripture teaches that we are simply reflecting the goodness of God that we have received.

RESPONDING TO GOD'S	Expressing goodness in worship involves declaring God's character aloud to one another, then back to God in praise.



Experiencing God's goodness in community means helping each other see how God's character is the origin of His good gifts. This especially applies to the love and fellowship we feel when we're together.

What does it look like to experience God's goodness in community? Discuss the options below, then write in one idea of your own:

In your conversations, practice connecting good news and celebrations to the character trait of God that made them possible. For example, you might say, "I'm really grateful for this answer to prayer. God is so powerful."

Jesus wasn't afraid to express His needs (John 4:7; Matthew 26:38). Have each group member share one personal need. It might be a need for physical help, spiritual guidance, emotional support, prayer, etc. As a group, make a plan to provide for those needs in the next week. Each person should practice receiving help and goodness from one another with humility and without guilt.

RESPONDING TO GOODNESS IN COMMUNITY

Goodness becomes a trait of our community when we treat each other with the goodness we've received from God.

What could it look like for goodness to be a marker of our community? Discuss the options on the next page, then write in one idea of your own.

The good works we do in the world are the overflow of what Jesus has done in our hearts through our redemption. Now we just need to walk in the reality of our new identity!

RECEIVING GOODNESS ON MISSION

Experiencing goodness on mission means listening with our hearts to hear God's call to the good work He's doing in the world. Discuss the options below, then write in one idea of your own:

VALUING GOODNESS


GOODNESS =

BEAUTY

We enjoy and create as a reflection of God's beauty.

When you hear the word **beauty**, what's the first thing that comes to mind?

WHAT IS BEAUTY?

That which reflects the glory of God.

WHERE IS BEAUTY FOUND?

Beauty and eternity belong to God.

What gain has the worker from his toil? I have seen the business that God has given to the children of man to be busy with. He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, He has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I perceived that there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil—this is God's gift to man.

I perceived that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it. God has done it, so that people fear before Him. That which is, already has been; that which is to be, already has been; and God seeks what has been driven away.

— Ecclesiastes 3:9-15

VALUING BEAUTY






WE CREATE AS A REFLECTION OF GOD'S BEAUTY

ENJOYING BEAUTY IN WORSHIP

Experiencing beauty in worship means that, out of our enjoyment of God and the beauty He creates, we worship Him.
